### From the desk of Reverend Doctor Willa M. Ross



#### **Disciple or Member?**

*Luke* 14:27 – "... And whoever does not carry their cross and follow me cannot be my disciple."

Growing up in the church I very seldom recall anyone referring to what it meant to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. As a teenager I remember the Pastor standing after the sermon had been preached and saying, "The doors of the church are open." I remember asking my mother why the Pastor did this every Sunday and what he meant when he said this. She explained to me that

this was the time when people would come and join the church. But she also shared with me that it was much more than joining the church. It was about giving your life to Jesus.

As I ponder my mother's words, "giving your life to Jesus," I wrestle with whether persons who have come in response to the doors of the church being open fully grasp the sincerity as well as the commitment involved in giving one's life to Jesus. Of course in the CME ritual, we call it the invitation to Christian Discipleship. But still pastors stand and say the **doors** of the church are open, (which in essence there is only one door through which ones come to accept Christ) and give a litany of reasons why one should come, but very seldom explain what Christian discipleship entails.

The truth of the matter is there is hardly enough time during the invitation to explain all that Christian Disciple entails. Thus the need for confirmation classes and membership training. This is why teaching in the church is not only necessary but imperative in leading persons to a decision to follow Jesus Christ. Accepting the invitation is merely the beginning.

Teaching about discipleship is a passion for me as a servant of Christ. I have learned during my years of pastoring that not everyone chooses to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. Some really do choose to be only members of the church.

We read in the Gospels that there were large crowds who followed Jesus, but after hearing Jesus' teachings about what was required to be his disciple, many made the decision to turn around. Many accepted his teachings but could not adhere to them. We know that the first twelve called by Jesus left everything to follow Jesus.

So the question for us to ponder in these modern times is what is truly involved in following Jesus? What is required to be a disciple of

Jesus Christ? What are one's responsibilities after accepting the Invitation to Christian Discipleship? Does one have to give up everything to become a disciple? Is it enough to show up for Sunday school and worship occasionally, be a member of a board or auxiliary, and bring an offering when one comes? What must one do to truly be considered a disciple? What is the meaning of Christian Discipleship?

The answers to these questions must come through an in-depth study of Jesus' teachings and discernment of God's calling on one's life. It is about becoming a disciple. It is a process that begins with accepting the invitation, followed by a commitment to a life of prayer and deep communion with God. The answers come not immediately but through one's desire to learn from the master teacher and grow spiritually.

It is simple to say I am a disciple of Jesus Christ but to truly be a disciple is a serious undertaking. It is a life-long journey of walking and learning from Jesus daily. Are you a disciple or a member?

Beginning in January during our Wednesday night Bible Study we will begin our study of Understanding Christian Discipleship. I challenge those who are wrestling with these questions to come and be a part of this time of learning?

Pink Sunday was implemented seven years ago by Komen Charlotte due to an increasing need to address specific health disparities seen in the community. Across the state/country:

- To date, African American women still have a higher incidence rate of breast cancer before age 45 and are more likely to die from breast cancer at every age.
- African American women are diagnosed with late stage breast cancer at a higher rate compared to other populations.
- By 2012, breast cancer death rates were 42% higher in black women than white women.

When breast cancer is diagnosed at later stages, it can affect treatment options and survival rates. Early detection is key and is linked to better survival rates

After worship service, the congregation assembled outside the church for prayer and release of pink balloons with loved ones name written on them. Pink cookie and pink punch was enjoyed by all.




Complete with costumes, memorized lines and great singing, Morning Chapel's children and youth department presented to us a play entitled, "Just a little



### MLK Celebration set for January 15



The 31st annual Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday Celebration, sponsored by the City of Fort Worth Martin Luther King

Jr./Juneteenth Employee Committee, is planned for noon Jan. 15 in Council Chambers at City Hall, 1000 Throckmorton St. The public is invited.

The theme is "The Time is Always Right to Do What is Right." The keynote speaker will be Max Krochmal, assistant professor in the TCU Department of History. His current book project follows a diverse group of ordinary people as they built multiracial political, civil rights and labor coalitions in mid-twentieth century Texas. He is the faculty leader of the TCU Civil Rights Bus Tour.

The mistress of ceremonies will be Monica Hamilton, deputy chief of staff in the Fort Worth Mayor and Council Office. The event will include live entertainment, music, vendors and more.

### The Fort Worth Nature Center & Refuge

The Fort Worth Nature Center

& Refuge (FWNC&R) is a natural area comprised of forests, prairies, and wetlands allowing you to step back in time and experience what the Fort Worth/Dallas Metroplex was like in the early 20th century. The inception of the FWNC&R was based on protecting our local watershed. In 1914 when Lake Worth was built land was purchased around the West Fork of the Trinity River by the City of Fort Worth to protect the quality of drinking water for the Fort Worth community. With great persistence from some local citizens, particularly the Fort Worth Audubon Society, the Park Board designated some land in 1964 to create a wildlife sanctuary and nature preserve for our community and the FWNC&R was born.

At its current state, the FWNC&R covers 3,621 acres and includes over 20 miles of hiking trails, making the parks one of the largest city-owned nature centers in the United Sates. In 1980 it was designated as a National Natural Landmark by the U.S. Department of the Interior. With the ever growing population of Fort Worth and the surrounding communities, having a place to explore and enjoy the outdoors is important for our residents. The FWNC&R is home to many native habitats to discover on a self –guided or staff-guided hike. Staff members offer many programs throughout the year providing opportunities for our visitors to learn about our natural world.

In addition to education, the FWNC&R is a shining example of land stewardship and was recognized with a Lone Star Land Steward award in 2009 by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Resource management staff work hard to preserve our ecosystems by promoting best practices to enhance the fauna and flora. Managing our bison herd and implementing prescribed burns are two of many ways we ensure our wildlife have a sustainable home.

The FWNC&R is a division of the City of Fort Worth Park and Recreation Department. Additional funds to support the FWNC&R come from The Friends of the Fort Worth Nature Center & Refuge (FONC). The FONC is a 501(c)3 organization that provides financial support for projects, professional development for staff and other operational needs.

## Recipe for the Month by: Linda Griffin

## Light Rum Cake

### Ingredients

- 2/3 cup pecans or walnut pieces
- 1 box yellow cake mix, with or without pudding in the mix
- 1 large egg, higher omega-3 egg if available
- 1/2 cup egg substitute
- 1/3 cup pineapple juice
- 1/2 cup fat free sour cream
- 1/2 cup dark rum, plus 2 tablespoons
- 2 tablespoons whipped butter or margarine, with 8 grams of fat per tablespoon
- 1/2 cup dark rum
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1/3 cup sugar substitute, if you don't want to use a sugar substitute, just increase the sugar to 1/2 cup



### Preparation

#### Step 1

Preheat oven to 325°F. Coat a 10-inch tube pan or 12-cup Bundt pan with canola cooking spray. Sprinkle the nuts over the bottom of the pan.

#### Step 2

In a large mixing bowl, combine the remaining cake ingredients (cake mix, egg, egg substitute, pineapple juice, sour cream, dark rum) and beat on medium speed until well blended. Pour the batter over the nuts in prepared pan.

#### Step 3

Bake in the center of oven for about 50-60 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Let the cake cool completely, and then invert it onto a serving plate.

#### Step 4


To make the glaze, melt the butter in a small, nonstick saucepan. Away from the heat, stir in 1/2 cup rum, 1/3 cup sugar, and 1/3 cup sugar substitute. After you've stirred the mixture, put back on the stove over medium heat and bring to a gentle boil. Continue to gently boil, stirring constantly, for about 4 minutes. Let cool for about 5 minutes.

#### Step 5

Prick the top of the cake all over with a skewer or large barbecue fork. Slowly spoon or pour the glaze evenly over the top. You can spoon or brush some of the glaze that drips off onto the sides of the cake.
